Principal's Corner

The teachers' convention is one of the many highlights of the school year for our teachers. This year marked the 68^{th} Protestant Reformed Teachers' Convention to be held. Teachers and administrators from Michigan, Iowa, Indiana, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Colorado, California, South Dakota, and Canada attended this convention on October 19 – 20 at Faith Christian School in Randolph, Wisconsin.

After the initial coffee time and singing, Rev. Regnerus delivered the keynote speech on Thursday morning based on Psalm 25 His speech was entitled "**Teachers as Guides**" and his three main points dealt with obstacles to teaching, standards for teaching, and encouragement to teachers.

Play-filled Learning

This year the kindergarten class has seen some changes. We made the move from a three-day week to four days a week. This change in schedule allows us more time to play as we learn. Research has found that at their age kindergartners still learn best by playing. It helps them remember ideas better when they are active in their learning and when they can make choices. The opportunities the students have to work on social skills during playful learning are also immeasurable.

Playful learning means that we are introduced to a Math concept, we practice it, and then we get to play with it. For example, when learning to count out objects to ten we talk about what it means and look at examples of what it looks like. Then we practice together with an activity. After that the students spend time each day with centers that are in essence games to play to practice their skills.

Learning to read and write is very hard work. While we still do have to complete practice that includes memorizing and rote work, we also get to play. We complete rotations during reading time that include working on words which includes playing with various letter blocks, letter tiles, making letters out of Play-Doh, and using a whole host of other manipulatives. using weak means such as teachers to fulfill His will. He is sovereign. Nothing is too great for our God. He will deliver us from the power of sin, Satan, and our own sinful desires. We need to encourage each other in this battle as well. God works marvelously and amazingly in the hearts of His people. Teachers need to show the students the glory of our God in all our lessons. We, as teachers, need to pray to God for the strength to fight and to prepare our souls for each day. The keynote was highly motivating to us as teachers in our classrooms. Pray that the Lord keeps us faithful in our calling to educate His covenant seed. If you ask any of the students, they will tell you that the end of the day is the best. This is a time called free play which has now been added to our day. During this time the students are allowed to play around the room. They can play with blocks, puzzles, cars, art materials, color, read books, there is a sensory bin, and about anything they can think of doing with the things that are in our classroom. The area named dramatic play is a huge favorite. This is an area for a kitchen, right now there is a pumpkin patch there, later it will include a vet clinic, a lemonade stand, a farmer's market, and a hot chocolate stand. This time gives them the most chances to work on their social-emotional learning. A few days ago two groups of students wanted to use the same area. I heard someone say, "We have to solve the problem, Mrs. Mooy says to solve the problem." They proceeded to do that very thing. We had previously talked about what options and choices they have when a problem arises and how to go about solving a problem. It was great to see them applying their learning and working together.

This makes for a very active classroom and a little noisy at times, too. I often think of Psalm 100 verse one which we are now memorizing. While we do make a joyful noise when we sing together in the morning, I believe our learning about God, His creation, and our role as servants is also a joyful noise that we make in the classroom.
